1832 Asset Management L.P. is the manager (the "Manager") of the fund. In this document, "we", "us", "our" and the "Manager" refer to 1832 Asset Management L.P. and the "Fund" refers to Scotia Wealth U.S. Value Pool.

The term "net asset value" or "net asset value per unit" in this document refers to the net asset value determined in accordance with Part 14 of National Instrument 81-106 – Investment Fund Continuous Disclosure ("National Instrument 81-106"); while the term "net assets" or "net assets per unit" refers to total equity or net assets attributable to unitholders of the Fund as determined in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS").

Results of Operations

For the six-month period ended at June 30, 2023 (the "period"), the Pinnacle Series Units of the Fund generated a total return of -2.7%. Fund returns are reported net of all management fees and expenses for all series, unlike the returns of the Fund's benchmark, which is based on the performance of an index that does not pay fees or incur expenses. Returns for other series of the Fund will be similar to Pinnacle Series Units of the Fund with any difference in performance being primarily due to different management fees, operating expenses and other expenses that are applicable to that particular series. Please see the "Past Performance" section for the performance of the Fund's other series.

The Fund's broad-based benchmark, the S&P 500 Index (C\$) returned 14.4% during the same period. In accordance with National Instrument 81-106, we have included a comparison to this broad-based index to help you understand the Fund's performance relative to the general performance of the market, but caution that the Fund's mandate may be significantly different from the index shown.

The Fund's relevant benchmark, the Russell 1000 Value Index (C\$) returned 2.9% during the same period. We have included this

comparison, which more closely reflects the market sectors and/or asset classes in which the Fund invests, to provide a more useful comparative to the performance of the Fund.

U.S. equity market performance was largely driven by a narrow number of stocks over the period. The top 10 stocks year-to-date accounted for 80% of the S&P 500 Index's total return. Performance for the Russell 1000 Value Index was only slightly broader with the top 10 stocks contributing roughly 73% of the total return. Much of the concentration in returns surrounded optimism related to generative artificial intelligence and its transformational potential. Investors flocked toward stocks with immediate exposure to this technology.

The Fund underperformed the relevant benchmark primarily as a result of stock selection in the Consumer Staples and Consumer Discretionary sectors, as well as underweight exposure to and stock selection in Communication Services.

Top individual detractors from performance included CVS Health Corp. and Dollar General Corp. The rating for CVS Health's largest Medicare plan declined in late 2022, which is expected to adversely impact earnings in 2024. If management is able to regain the plan's higher rating in the second half of 2023, the company would benefit in 2025. Despite CVS Health's recent setbacks, earnings continue to rise, and its Board approved a 10% dividend increase in each of the last two years. Dollar General experienced an unusual period of execution issues exacerbated by external pressures on its core consumer. Inefficiencies in the company's distribution centres led to labour challenges in its stores and items being out of stock. This, in turn, resulted in decreased customer satisfaction, declining traffic trends and the need to invest in price to win customers back. This all took place while Dollar General's core customer base was being impacted by the end of government stimulus, lower tax receipts and a cut to SNAP (supplemental nutritional assistance program) benefits.

Stock selection in the Industrials sector and an underweight allocation to the Utilities sector contributed to the Fund's performance. Top individual contributors included W.W. Grainger Inc. and Microchip Technology Inc. The upward trajectory of W. W. Grainger's earnings means the internal rate of the return should remain favourable. It is likely that the company will announce a dividend increase following a period of several years where earnings have grown much faster than dividends, resulting in a declining payout ratio. W.W. Grainger remains a core holding for the Fund, that is well positioned for continued market share gains. Microchip Technology may also increase its dividend by 9% per quarter, or roughly 40% per year, in both 2023 and 2024. The company's share repurchases should also accelerate as it has delivered to its target range. The stock remains a large core holding for the Fund.

During the period, a new holding in Service Corp. International was added to the Fund. Service Corp. is the largest company in the highly fragmented U.S./Canada death care space (approximately 10 times the size of the second-largest company) and is a skilled acquirer, developer and operator of funeral homes, crematoriums and cemeteries. Its business model exhibits relative stability and

limited disruption risk, and we believe Service Corp. should provide stable and predictable revenue, earnings and cash flow growth.

In addition, holdings in UnitedHealth Group Inc. and Dollar General were increased as we believe they have better risk/reward profiles. We acknowledge that it will take time for Dollar General to start up new distribution centres and stabilize traffic trends, but at current share prices we believe there is an opportunity for higher future returns.

The Fund's holdings in W.W. Grainger, Microchip Technology and AmerisourceBergen Corp. were trimmed based on valuations.

The Fund's net asset value decreased to \$187.4 million at June 30, 2023, from \$199.8 million at December 31, 2022. This change was composed of net redemptions of \$7.2 million and investment performance of negative \$5.2 million. The investment performance of the Fund includes income and expenses which vary year over year. The Fund's income and expenses changed compared to the previous year mainly as a result of fluctuations in average net assets, portfolio activity and changes in the Fund's income earning investments.

Certain series of the Fund, as applicable, may make distributions at a rate determined by the Manager from time to time. If the aggregate amount of distributions in such series exceeds the portion of net income and net realized capital gains allocated to such series, the excess will constitute a return of capital. The Manager does not believe that the return of capital distributions made by such series of the Fund have a meaningful impact on the Fund's ability to implement its investment strategy or to fulfill its investment objective.

Recent Developments

Risk Rating Change

Effective May 31, 2023, the risk rating of the Fund has been changed from Low to Medium to Medium. This change is in accordance with the Risk Classification Methodology mandated by the Canadian Securities Administrators. There are no changes to the investment objective or strategies of the Fund associated with the new risk rating.

Related Party Transactions

The Manager is a wholly-owned subsidiary of The Bank of Nova Scotia ("Scotiabank"). Scotiabank also owns, directly or indirectly, 100% of Scotia Securities Inc., a mutual fund dealer, and Scotia Capital Inc. (which includes ScotiaMcLeod and Scotia iTRADE), an investment dealer.

The Manager, on behalf of the Fund, may enter into transactions or arrangements with other members of Scotiabank or certain other companies that are related or connected to the Manager (each a "related party"). All transactions between the Fund and the related parties are in the normal course of business and are carried out at arm's length terms.

The purpose of this section is to provide a brief description of any transaction involving the Fund and a related party.

Management Fees

The Manager is responsible for the day-to-day management and operations of the Fund. Certain series of the Fund pay the Manager a management fee for its services as described in the “Management Fee” section later in this document. The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of each series of the Fund, accrued daily and paid monthly.

Fixed Administration Fees and Fund Costs

The Manager pays the operating expenses of the Fund, other than Fund Costs, in exchange for the payment by the Fund of a fixed rate administration fee (the “Fixed Administration Fee”) to the Manager with respect to each series of the Fund. The expenses charged to the Fund in respect of the Fixed Administration Fee are disclosed in the Fund’s financial statements. The Fixed Administration Fee is equal to a specified percentage of the net asset value of a series, calculated and paid in the same manner as the management fees for the Fund. Further details about the Fixed Administration Fee can be found in the Fund’s most recent simplified prospectus.

In addition, each series of the Fund is responsible for its proportionate share of certain operating expenses (“Fund Costs”). Further details about Fund Costs can be found in the Fund’s most recent simplified prospectus.

The Manager, at its sole discretion, may waive or absorb a portion of a series’ expenses. These waivers or absorptions may be terminated at any time without notice.

Other Fees

The Manager, or its affiliates, may earn fees and spreads in connection with various services provided to, or transactions with, the Fund, such as banking, custody, brokerage, foreign exchange or derivatives transactions. The Manager, or its affiliates, may earn a foreign exchange spread when unitholders switch between series of funds denominated in different currencies.

Independent Review Committee

The Manager has established an independent review committee (the “IRC”) in accordance with National Instrument 81-107 – Independent Review Committee for Investment Funds (“NI 81-107”) with a mandate to review and provide recommendations or approval, as required, on conflict of interest matters referred to it by the Manager on behalf of the Fund. The IRC is responsible for overseeing the Manager’s decisions in situations where the Manager is faced with any present or perceived conflicts of interest, all in accordance with NI 81-107.

The IRC may also approve certain mergers between the Fund and other funds, and any change of the auditor of the Fund. Subject to any corporate and securities law requirements, no securityholder approval will be obtained in such circumstances, but you will be sent a written notice at least 60 days before the effective date of any such transaction or change of auditor. In certain circumstances, securityholder approval may be required to approve certain mergers.

The IRC has five members, Stephen J. Griggs (Chair), Steven Donald, Simon Hitzig, Heather A. T. Hunter and Jennifer L. Witterick, each of whom is independent of the Manager.

The IRC prepares and files a report to the securityholders each fiscal year that describes the IRC and its activities for securityholders as well as contains a complete list of the standing instructions. These standing instructions enable the Manager to act in a particular conflict of interest matter on a continuing basis provided the Manager complies with its policies and procedures established to address that conflict of interest matter and reports periodically to the IRC on the matter. This report to the securityholders is available on the Manager’s website or, at no cost, by contacting the Manager.

The compensation and other reasonable expenses of the IRC will be paid out of the assets of the Fund as well as out of the assets of the other investment funds for which the IRC may act as the independent review committee. Each member of the IRC receives an annual retainer of \$62,000 (\$77,000 for the Chair), plus expenses for each meeting. The fees and expenses, plus associated legal costs, are allocated among all of the funds managed by the Manager for which the IRC acts as the independent review committee in a manner that is considered by the Manager to be fair and reasonable. The main component of compensation is an annual retainer fee. Prior to November 1, 2021, each IRC member also received a fee for each committee meeting attended. Expenses of the IRC may include premiums for insurance coverage, travel expenses and reasonable out-of-pocket expenses.

The Manager, in respect of the Fund, received the following standing instructions from the IRC with respect to related party transactions:

- Paying brokerage commissions and spreads to a related party for effecting security transactions on an agency and principal basis on behalf of the Fund;
- Purchases or sales of securities of an issuer from or to another investment fund managed by the Manager;
- Investments in the securities of issuers for which a related underwriter acted as an underwriter during the distribution of such securities and the 60-day period following the completion of such distribution;
- Executing foreign exchange transactions with a related party on behalf of the Fund;
- Purchases of securities of a related party;
- Entering into over-the-counter derivatives on behalf of the Fund with a related party;
- Outsourcing products and services to related parties which can be charged to the Fund;
- Acquisition of prohibited securities as defined by securities regulations;
- Trading in mortgages with a related party;
- Entering into a designated broker agreement with a related party; and

- Entering into a prime broker agreement with a related party.

The Manager is required to advise the IRC of any breach of a condition of the standing instructions. The standing instructions require, among other things, that the investment decision in respect to a related party transaction: (a) is made by the Manager free from any influence by an entity related to the Manager and without taking into account any consideration to any associate or affiliate of the Manager; (b) represents the business judgment of

the Manager uninfluenced by considerations other than the best interests of the Fund; and (c) is made in compliance with the Manager's written policies and procedures. Transactions made by the Manager under the standing instructions are subsequently reviewed by the IRC to monitor compliance.

The Manager, in respect of the Fund, did not rely on IRC standing instructions regarding related party transactions during the period.

- (4) The Fund's portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the Fund's portfolio advisor manages its portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the period. The higher a fund's portfolio turnover rate in a period, the greater the trading costs payable by the fund in the period, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a fund.

Management Fees

The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of each series of the Fund, accrued daily and paid monthly. The management fees cover the costs of managing the Fund, arranging for investment analysis, recommendations and investment decision making for the Fund, arranging for distribution of the Fund, marketing and promotion of the Fund and providing or arranging for other services.

The breakdown of services received in consideration of management fees for each series, as a percentage of the management fees, are as follows:

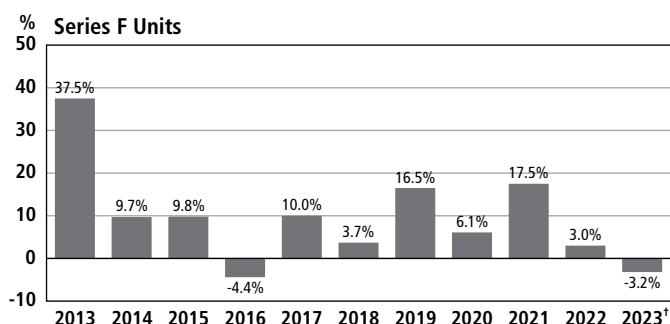
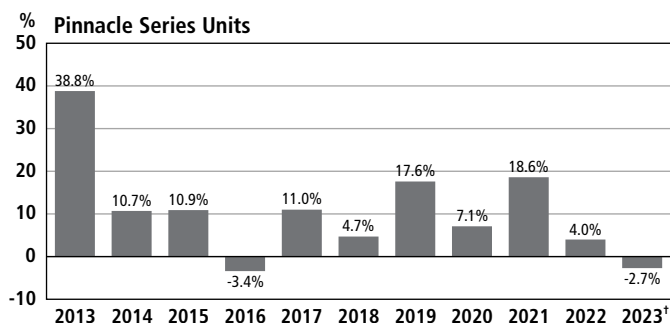
Past Performance

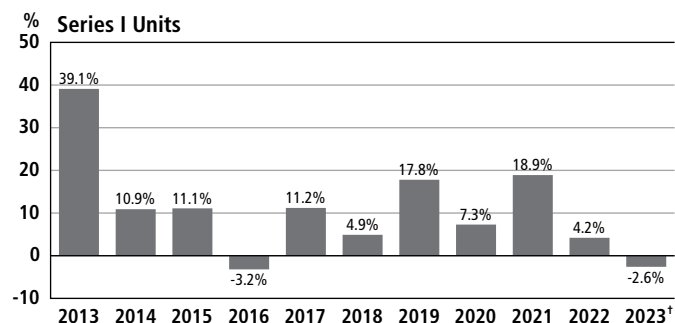
